

Graduate Employment Market 2023-24





This analysis aims to provide insights into the current state of the job market for recent graduates and apprentices, highlighting key trends and challenges.

Employment rates in the working age population (16 - 64 years old) 2023

Postgraduate		89.4%
Graduate		87.7%
Non-graduate	68.7%	

In 2023, graduates and postgraduates in the working-age population had broadly similar employment rates. Employment outcomes for nongraduates were considerably worse compared to graduates and postgraduates.

The unemployment rate was:

5.1% for non-graduates 3.0% for graduates 2.1% for postgraduates

In addition, over one in four non-graduates (27.6%) were economically inactive in 2023, compared to 9.6% of graduates and 8.7% of postgraduates.


Unemployment rates are higher in the young population (21 - 30 year olds) compared to the working age population, There are many reasons why unemployment rates for young graduates and postgraduates are higher than working-age, one explanation could be initial difficulty in entering the job market.

The unemployment rate was:

7.1% for non-graduates5.5% for graduates3.0% for postgraduates



High-skilled employment rate amongst the young population (21 - 30 years old) 2023



Young postgraduates had the greatest high-skilled employment rate at 76.4% in 2023. In addition, 60.4% of young graduates were in high-skilled employment compared to 20.7% of non-graduates.



Preparing for the workforce

Studies show that the majority (64%) of undergraduates undertake some period of unpaid work experience, with 41% of this group doing so for at least one month.

Securing a job role is a process many students start before graduating. The time it usually takes for graduates to secure a job varies anywhere between three to 18 months.

In demand graduate skills

- Presentation skills (79%)
- Interpersonal skills (88%)
- Work-appropriate written skills (81%) and verbal skills (87%)
- Teamwork skills (92%)
- Problem-solving (90%)
- Basic IT and digital skills (90%)
- Numeracy skills (86%)



Looking to the future

By 2035, more than 11 million extra graduates, in addition to the 15.3 million graduates currently in the UK workforce, will be needed to fill jobs in the UK by 2035, in industries such as computing and engineering, teaching and education, and health. 88% of new jobs by 2035 will be at graduate level.

Graduates will be needed to fill roles by 2035 in the North West of England, with 79% of new jobs being at graduate level.

5 areas in need of graduates by 2035:

- **Tech**: The UK will need over 1.9 million STEM professionals, including in areas such as computing and engineering. Computer programming is the occupation that is expected to grow the most in the UK.
- Health: The UK will need over 1.2 million health and social care professionals, such as doctors, nurses and youth and community workers.
- **Education**: The UK will need 1 million teaching and educational professionals, such as university and higher education teachers.
- **Digital**: Due to AI, there will be a 10% net increase in jobs that require a degree over the next 20 years.
- Creative skills: A university degree teaches transferable skills, such as
 the creative and critical thinking needed for problem-solving. The UK
 will need over 1.2 million business services professionals, including
 professionals in advertising and marketing.



Apprenticeships employment market

Additionally, a new report launched during UK National Apprenticeship Week 2023 found that almost half of the public (44%) believe apprenticeships offer better career prospects than university. This shows a shift in perception towards apprenticeships, signalling their growing appeal among the UK public.




Starts by Age



48% of the apprenticeships started in 2022/23 were by people aged 25 and over, while 23% were aged under 19 and 29% were aged between 19 and 24.



Starts by Level



The different levels of apprenticeship that can be started by people aged 16 or over are:

- Intermediate (Level 2) equivalent to GCSE
- Advanced (Level 3) equivalent to A-level
- Higher (Levels 4,5,6 and 7) equivalent to a foundation degree and above
- Degree (Levels 6 and 7) equivalent to a Bachelor's or Master's degree

44% of starts at advanced level and 33% at higher level. The remaining 23% were at intermediate level.
